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TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

YEAR ENDING 31 DECEMBER 2022

2022 was a busy year for the Association as we sought to move on from the pandemic, returning to in-person courses and more events.

The objectives of the Association, as set out in the Constitution of November 2017, are to work towards the continuation and protection of the craft of hand engraving for the benefit of the public through education and training. To this end, the Association Director, Sally Dodson and Administration Manager, Lucinda Rowe supported by the board of trustees, organised a number of events, training courses and activities during 2022.

Courses

One of the key aims of the Hand Engravers Association is to provide education and training in the craft. During 2022 we ran courses on the basic principles of hand engraving, both online and in person, and in person courses in Lettering and Tools Preparation. All have been well attended and received very positive feedback. Our online courses continue to attract an international audience, with attendees from Australia, Canada, USA, Japan and Malaysia.

Apprenticeships and Training

It's About Time – Demonstrating Engraving in April

Seal Engraving Course

In April we ran an intensive course on seal engraving, the first of its kind in the UK. Master Engraver, Wayne Parrott, who was unable to teach the course face-to-face due to Covid restrictions, developed written learning resources and three step-by-step projects in seal engraving as a basis for the training. The workshop was led by Anastasia Young and Andrew Ashcroft, with live demonstrations given by Megan Rigby of Rebus Signet Rings and pre-recorded video demonstrations by Wayne. After the workshop Wayne assessed and gave individual feedback to each of the seven students.

We are hugely grateful to The Goldsmiths' Centre for financial support and for the use of their workshops and specialist equipment, and to the Radcliffe Trust. Without the support from both these organisations this unique project would not have been possible.
